The day Luca Onley and I spent In my boat supporting Matua Eric and the waka as they paddled into the inlet at my house, is right up there. Residential camps to Lake Rotoiti, Te Towaka, Kaihoka, Bridge Valley and Totaranui and seeing our tamariki operating in the outdoors, is again some thing to celebrate. Being part of a group with our tamariki responding a whale stranding, speaks for itself. Observing our tamariki and the "free play" we see everyday is something special. On a daily basis at lunchtimes we have bikes, scooters and skateboards all over the place, while some students are engaged in board games inside. Others fill the field with games of football.

Suffice to say I am looking forward to the next chapter in my life, while acknowledging it will be very very hard for me to walk away from CAS on the 18th December. This school and living here, has an ability to capture your heart and mind. I will remain in the Bay while spending more time in Nelson with my close whānau.

I thank you all for the being on the journey, the tough times, the sad times and fun times. It has been an honour serving you.


Movember

MINI TOSI Amuri

A couple of weeks ago, myself and Logan along with 18 other students all went down for Mini Tosi in Culverden at Amuri Area School. This year we had a young team with a wide range of age groups, there were some kids from Year 7 and 8 and a couple of returning Year 9 and 10s.





WHOOPING COUGH

Whooping cough (pertussis) is a highly infectious disease and causes breathing difficulties and severe coughing fits. It can be very serious for tamariki and young babies.



It can easily spread between family members by coughing and sneezing. It can also spread quickly around early education centres and schools, which is why it is important to make sure your whānau are up-to-date with vaccinations.

Whooping cough vaccines are free for pregnant people, all children under 18 years old and adults from 45 and 65 years old.

The Boostrix vaccine also offers protection against tetanus and diphtheria.
